Course Description:

This course aims to equip students with knowledge of basic and practical French. Practical aspects of using French in daily life scenarios will be used to help students broaden their horizons, gain some understanding of the French culture, and acquire basic proficiency to communicate in French, especially in the areas of writing and speaking.

Course Goals:

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate competency in the following general education core goals:

- **Critical thinking skills** Students will engage in creative and/or innovative thinking, and/or inquiry, analysis, evaluation, synthesis of information, organizing concepts, and constructing solutions.
- **Communication skills** Students will demonstrate effective written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Teamwork** Students will demonstrate the ability to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal and consider different points of view.
- **Social responsibility** Students will demonstrate intercultural competency and civic knowledge by engaging effectively in local, regional, national, and global communities.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- interact orally, read and write basic constructions using the present tense;
- identify the tone of a conversation and its main message;

- use the resources provided to increase their vocabulary and knowledge of grammatical structures;
- converse about French culture, showing some knowledge of popular culture/literature and art associated with French-speaking countries.

Course Requirements:

Class Participation

Your participation grade does not depend simply on your being physically present in class. A good participation grade depends on having all your assignments completed before class, participating (in French) to the best of your ability, and making a real effort to improve. Keep in mind that when you are not in class, no matter what the reason, you are missing essential time spent in French. This has a negative impact on your progress and the participation component of your grade.

Homework

You will have a wide variety of homework assignments – exercises from your workbook and from worksheets distributed in class, and they are all counted as part of this component of your grade.

Quizzes and Exams

The regular quizzes will allow you and your instructor to keep a closer eye on your progress, identifying both those areas in which you have mastered the material and those items that you need to review further.

The midterm exam will take place on lecture 12. The written part consists of: oral comprehension, grammar and vocabulary exercises, reading comprehension, and a short writing activity. The oral part is a dialogue / conversation with your instructor or a classmate. You will get constructive feedback on your French and your pronunciation. It is a good practice for the final oral exam. The final exam (written and oral) is administered at the end of the semester.
