## Course Description:

Introduction to Psychology II is the second part of a survey course covering the major areas of psychology. Along with Introduction to Psychology I, it explores fundamental research methods, current studies across various topics, and key theories within the field. While Introduction to Psychology I focuses on areas like the history of psychology, research methods, the biological basis of behavior, sensation and perception, consciousness, learning, memory, and language, Introduction to Psychology II continues the survey of the field with explorations of psychological assessment, motivation and emotions, human development, personality theories, stress and health, psychopathology, psychological disorders, prosocial and antisocial behavior, therapy, and social psychology, and applied psychology.

#### **Course Goals:**

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate competency in the following general education core goals:

- Critical thinking skills Students will engage in creative and/or innovative thinking, and/or inquiry, analysis, evaluation, synthesis of information, organizing concepts and constructing solutions.
- **Communication skills** Students will demonstrate effective written, oral and visual communication.
- Teamwork Students will demonstrate the ability to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal and consider different points of view.
- Social responsibility Students will demonstrate intercultural competency and civic knowledge by engaging effectively in local, regional, national and global communities.

# **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand and explain fundamental psychological terminology, as well as key aspects of major psychological concepts and theories;
- Critically evaluate information about human behavior, distinguishing between scientifically supported conclusions and those based on nonscientific reasoning;
- Demonstrate applied psychology research skills;
- Be able to describe and evaluate different types of psychological treatments;
- Be able to elucidate criteria used to judge abnormality and demonstrate an understanding of stereotypes related to psychological disorders.

## Course Requirements:

### Attendance/Participation

Regular attendance and in-class participation. Missed classes and non-participation will result in a reduction of the mark.

### In-class assignments

There will be 3 in-class assignments throughout the course. A grade of 0 will be assigned to those students who miss an in-class assignment (no exceptions).

#### Quizzes

The randomly distributed quizzes consist of multiple choice and short answer questions, which cover the assigned reading for that week. The goal of the quizzes is to encourage proper lecture preparation. Each quiz will take about 15 minutes to complete and start at the beginning of class. Students arriving later than 5 minutes from the start of the class or students who miss a quiz will receive a 0 on that quiz (no exceptions).

### **Academic Paper**

You should choose a topic from the topic list available on the very first lecture that is relevant to the course and if uncertain, approved beforehand by the instructor. You are expected to follow the conventions of grammar, spelling, and punctuation. Arguments and content should be logical and coherent, supported by evidence from the literature or primary sources, and should always reference the author of such works. Written assignments should be word-processed and double-spaced.

#### **Exams**

The mid-term will be a multiple-choice exam and the final exam will be comprehensive. The final exam will contain multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. To pass the course, students must achieve a passing grade of 60% on the final examination. A failed final exam will result in a failed course. Alternate arrangements will not be made for students unable to write the final examination at

the scheduled time/date unless exceptional circumstances prevail and the instructor has given approval in advance.

All evaluative components for this course are compulsory and must be completed in order to pass the course.
