Course Description:

This intermediate microeconomics course employs calculus to model the behavior of consumers and producers through utility maximization and profit maximization problems. We will derive demand and supply curves in competitive markets and analyze the conditions under which market equilibrium is deemed efficient. The course will also explore real-world scenarios, such as externalities caused by certain products or markets with limited producers, to understand why such situations deviate from efficiency and evaluate potential policy interventions aimed at improving market outcomes.

Course Goals:

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate competency in the following general education core goals:

- Critical thinking skills Students will engage in creative and/or innovative thinking, and/or inquiry, analysis, evaluation, synthesis of information, organizing concepts, and constructing solutions.
- **Communication skills** Students will demonstrate effective written, oral, and visual communication.
- Teamwork Students will demonstrate the ability to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal and consider different points of view.
- Social responsibility Students will demonstrate intercultural competency and civic knowledge by engaging effectively in local, regional, national, and global communities.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- show fluency in the basic concepts, models and tools of microeconomic and macroeconomic theory;
- think critically about economic phenomena and economic debates by using multiple kinds of texts, evidence and conceptual approaches;
- apply economic reasoning to understand the causal determinants of economic events, empirical regularities, and policy proposals.

Attendance and Participation

The class meetings are intended to facilitate meaningful student-instructor and student-student interactions. You are expected to attend these class meetings and conduct yourself professionally. It is assumed that you have read the assigned material before attending class and are prepared to answer questions based on the readings and assignments. I will call on students by name to answer questions in class.

Homework Assignments

Over the semester there will be several problem-sets and reading assignments. Homework assignments will be graded based primarily on completion. However, student responses which fail to answer the stated question, lack sufficient support/explanation, or is of poor quality will suffer from point deductions.

Exams

There will be three exams during the semester. Exams will be a combination of shortand long-response questions. During the exam, students will only be allowed to have a simple 4-function or scientific calculator during the exam (no personal phone or graphing calculator is allowed for use). Additionally, practice exam material will be made available approximately one week before every exam, which will give students a sense of the difficulty of each exam.
