Course Description:

Introduction to Psychology I offers an overview of key psychological concepts, theories, and methods used in the scientific exploration of behavior and mental processes. The course covers a range of topics, including the nervous system, human development, sensation, perception, learning, memory, language, motivation, emotion, and personality.

Course Goals:

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate competency in the following general education core goals:

- **Critical thinking skills** – Students will engage in creative and/or innovative thinking, and/or inquiry, analysis, evaluation, synthesis of information, organizing concepts and constructing solutions.
- **Communication skills** – Students will demonstrate effective written, oral and visual communication.
- **Teamwork** – Students will demonstrate the ability to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal and consider different points of view.
- **Social responsibility** – Students will demonstrate intercultural competency and civic knowledge by engaging effectively in local, regional, national and global communities.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- gain a foundational understanding of key psychological concepts, principles, and theories;
- describe the scientific methods used in psychological research and critically assess research findings;

- apply psychological concepts to real-life situations for a deeper understanding of the world.

Introduction to Psychology: Gateways to Mind and Behavior by Dennis Coon, John O. Mitterer, and Tanya S. Martini, Cengage Learning, 15th Edition.

You are required to bring your laptop to this class to follow along with or complete our in-class exercises.

Course Requirements:

Assignments

This component of the course will be a combination of small assignments as assigned and handed out in class throughout the semester. These assignments will always be mentioned in class slides, so if you miss class it is up to you to make sure you are keeping up to date.

Quizzes

To incentivize reading assigned materials and coming to class for lectures, there will be regular quizzes throughout the semester. These quizzes will be short and should be fairly easy if you have been keeping up with class material.

Papers

From the list of chapters that are in our regular textbook, you should choose any 3 chapters that sound interesting to you. They cannot all be from the same main category (e.g., Psychology as Science, Biological Basis of Behavior, etc.), as the goal is to give you a range of different information. Note: you are picking chapters, not sections. For each of these chapters, you will be required to read the chapter, then write a short paper (at least 500 words, approx. 2 pages) describing and summarizing that chapter. These papers will be due throughout the span of the semester, each on one chapter. You should make sure to write this paper in your own words, and not just copy directly from the textbook and other sources.

Exams

There will be a midterm exam and a cumulative final exam during finals week throughout the semester. The exam during the semester will be non-cumulative, and cover only the material picking up where the prior lectures ended. The final exam is cumulative over the entire semester. The mid-term takes up 20% while the final takes up 30% of the final grades.
